

Grenadier Guards, Enlisted Men. D.C.M. - Medal Awards: 1st World War – Private's



Distinguished Conduct Medal – D.C.M

The Distinguished Conduct Medal was instituted on 4th December 1854 during the Crimean War as an award for bravery in action by "other ranks" i.e. non-commissioned officers and men of the British and Empire armies. The medal was usually accompanied by a small pension. During World War I it was also awarded to men of the Royal Naval Division serving under Army Command.

Ribbon: Red with dark Blue central stripe



Private: Herbert **Bull, D.C.M.**, 17063. 2nd Battalion Grenadier Guards. Died 15th September 1916. Listed on Pier and Face 8D, Thiepval Memorial, Somme, France

Private: James **Grundy, D.C.M.**, 11477. 5th Battalion Grenadier Guards. Died 2nd July 1918, Aged 31. Son of Jolm and Zilpha Grundy, of Stoke-on-Trent. Husband of Ethel May Dearnley (formerly Grundy), of Pimlico, London. At Rest: Stoke-on-Trent (Hartshill) Cemetery, Staffordshire. Buried: Grave 639 (CD)

Private: Harry John **Morgan, D.C.M.**, 16479. 4th Battalion Grenadier Guards. Died 2nd September 1917. Listed on Panel 9, Tyne Cot Memorial Zonnebeke, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium

Private: John William **Warner, D.C.M.**, 11839. 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards. Died of wounds 17th November 1914, Aged 27. Son of John and Elizabeth Warner, of Bolsover, Chesterfield, Derbyshire. At Rest: Boulogne Eastern Cemetery, Pas de Calais, France. Buried: Plot III, Row A, Grave 46
